

**MINUTES
OF THE
LA PAZ COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS
Monday, December 5, 2011, 10:00 a.m.
Regular Meeting**

Chairman Irwin called the December 5, 2011, regular meeting of the La Paz County Board of Supervisors to order at 10:03 a.m. Elected Officials and Department Heads present were Chairman Irwin, Supervisor Pierce, Supervisor Drum, County Administrator Field, Clerk of the Board Hale, Deputy County Attorney Buckelew, Assessor Nault, Recorder Baker, Interim Public Works Director Simmons, Treasurer Castro, Interim Public Defender Sorrell, Health Director Shontz, Chief Building Inspector Baker, and Administrative Assistant Green.

Chairman Irwin led the Pledge of Allegiance followed by the Invocation given by Pastor Jere Martynotte of the Big River Baptist Church.

Presentation: “Sandy Dodge Employee Excellence Award”

Clerk of the Board Hale presented the “Sandy Dodge Employee Excellence Award” for the month of October 2011 to Pam Spencer, Child Support Legal Assistant, along with a \$25 gift certificate to Walmart; and for the month of November 2011 to Jennifer Kirby, Secretary for the Treasurer, along with a \$25 gift certificate to Walmart.

Presentation: Christopher Davey, EnviroMission, La Paz Solar Tower Project

Christopher Davey, accompanied by his father, Roger Davey, Chairman of EnviroMission, gave a report on the La Paz Solar Tower Project, stating that they are looking into the permits required in order to break ground. He stated that the community will start seeing more activity as the balance of the environmental studies is underway. He noted that a project website will provide links to the majority of their project management, for information on projected employment, environmental concerns, etc.

Roger Davey stated that the plant is the first of its kind, made of a new material, and the designing firm involved has had impressive projects all over the world and is working around the clock on the design.

Christopher Davey explained that this high profile project is moving along now in an uninterrupted manner; and there will be people here gathering information regarding access for water, housing and materials to the site.

He described the structure to a “large greenhouse” about 50 feet off the ground and approximately 2600 feet tall, with 32 turbines positioned around the base. He explained the technology, noting that it is environmentally “incredibly benign”; a friendly and cost effective way to generate electricity.

King Clapperton asked what benefit this project will provide the community.

Christopher Davey stated that the construction firm has a mandate to employ as many local talents as possible; anticipating that 1500 employees will be needed for the construction, maintenance and security, and approximately 40 longer term positions will be available. He stated that the structure will be built with a lifetime of approximately 75 years, not the usual 30-35 years associated with most other projects. He added that an economic analysis had been completed noting millions of dollars to be made on indirect impacts as well, such to local businesses and the school system.

Roger Davey stated that it will be an “engineering masterpiece”, noting that, on another location, tourist groups hired busses to come see the sight of a proposed tower. He felt it would be the same for La Paz County.

Supervisor Drum stated it will be the highest tower in the United States.

Robert Page asked if the project will be using local supplies.

Christopher Davey stated that they will whenever possible; noting that a large amount of aggregate will be required and he encouraged the public to reach out with information brochures when a representative is here or should anyone come to their Phoenix office. He added notices will be published in the paper.

Pat Jones inquired whether the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) was aware of the project.

Christopher Davey stated that they had filed with the FAA last month, who is aware of the project, and they will be going through the process, which he was very familiar with.

Mr. Page asked if the energy produced was already sold, or would it be stored and negotiated.

Christopher Davey answered that the majority of the power has already been contracted for; however, if contracting locally is something someone wanted to explore, there is sufficient amount “un-contracted” for that reason.

Chairman Irwin stated the Board will be looking for other updates in the future.

Current Event Summary

County Administrator Field stated that he had no current events information at the time; however, he will begin again reporting the proposed legislation dealing with the major

issues for the County such as the prison transfer issue the legislation is trying “to force down our throat”.

Supervisor Pierce also noted that the Highway User Revenue Fund (HURF), which has been “pilfered” from the Counties, is also a concern.

SUPERVISOR PIERCE MOVED to approve Consent Agenda Items #6(a) through #6(f). Motion seconded by Supervisor Drum, passed unanimously.

Chairman Irwin recessed the Board of Supervisors and convened the Jail District Board of Directors at 10:49 a.m.

County Administrator Field presented for approval Consent Agenda Items #7(a) and #7(b).

7(a) Approval of Jail District Payroll

Approve November 6, 2011, through November 19, 2011, gross payroll, as presented, in the amount of \$62,725.08, plus employer benefit contributions of \$10,268.92, for a total of \$72,994.00, including handwritten warrants.

7(b) Approval of Jail District Demands

Approve Jail District demands, as presented, in the amount of \$25,154.03, including handwritten warrants.

SUPERVISOR DRUM MOVED to approve Consent Agenda Items #7(a) and #7(b). Motion seconded by Supervisor Pierce, passed unanimously.

Appoint Detention Support Specialist, a vacant budgeted position (*Replacement*)

Lieutenant Nelson, on behalf of Commander Davis, requested appointment of Andrea Salazar as a Detention Support Specialist, a vacant budgeted position, at a salary of \$22,655, with no benefits except what is required by statute. He noted Ms. Salazar has met all requirements.

SUPERVISOR PIERCE MOVED to appoint Andrea Salazar as Detention Support Specialist, effective December 5, 2011, at a salary of \$22,655, without benefits, with a six month probationary period. Motion seconded by Chairman Irwin, passed unanimously.

Chairman Irwin recessed the Jail District Board of Directors and reconvened the Board of Supervisors at 10:51 a.m.

PUBLIC HEARING(S):

Docket No. Z2011-007, Ron Lenarth, APN: 302-50-024C, requesting to rezone the Northeastern most portions from C-2/C-1 (General Commercial/Local Commercial) to MHS (Manufactured/Mobile Home Subdivision) for future land division; property located at 49809 Ehrenberg/Parker Highway, in Ehrenberg

Chief Building Inspector Baker presented Docket No. Z2011-007, Ron Lenarth, APN: 302-50-024C, requesting to rezone the Northeastern most portions from C-2/C-1 (General Commercial/Local Commercial) to MHS (Manufactured/Mobile Home Subdivision) for future land division; property located at 49809 Ehrenberg/Parker Highway, in Ehrenberg.

He stated that 25 surrounding and adjacent property owners were notified and no comments were received. He noted that the request follows the Comprehensive Plan and that the southern portion of the property will maintain a bar/restaurant use.

He stated there was one stipulation, that being the signature requirement on an A.R.S. §12-1134 (207) Waiver; however, the department would have to be sure that the applicant either abandons the existing leach field or septic tanks for the bar/restaurant or divide the property in such a manner so that it is not on the MHS zoned property.

Supervisor Pierce asked Chief Building Inspector Baker if there would be any conflicts upon approval of the proposed new zoning regulations.

Chief Building Inspector Baker stated that there would be no conflicts.

A brief discussion ensued in which Supervisor Drum stated that he wished to be clear that the record show that the onsite wastewater system must be on the property/parcel it serves.

Chief Building Inspector Baker stated that the issue would be addressed when the applicant “turns real property for sale”.

Chairman Irwin opened the public hearing and asked if anyone wished to comment on the request for a rezone.

There being no comment, Chairman Irwin closed the public hearing.

SUPERVISOR DRUM MOVED to approve Docket No. Z2011-007, Ron Lenarth, APN: 302-50-024C, to rezone the Northeastern most portions from C-2/C-1 (General Commercial/Local Commercial) to MHS (Manufactured/Mobile Home Subdivision) for future land division, property located at 49809 Ehrenberg/Parker Highway, in Ehrenberg. Motion seconded by Chairman Irwin.

Supervisor Pierce asked if the waiver was included.

SUPERVISOR DRUM AMENDED HIS MOTION to include the stipulations that the applicant: 1) move the property line to meet the required setbacks for the Health Department regarding the septic system currently on the commercial portion and 2) sign an A.R.S. §12-1134 (207) Waiver. Motion seconded by Supervisor Pierce, passed unanimously.

Docket No. FP2011-004, Sunset Indian Hills, APN: 304-70-003A/003C, requesting a Final Plat for thirty-one (31) residential lots, zoned RVS (Recreational Vehicle Subdivision) on 4.66 acres located in Township 5N, Range 13W, Section 21 of the Gila and Salt River Meridian, in Salome

Chief Building Inspector Baker presented Docket No. FP2011-004, Sunset Indian Hills, APN: 304-70-003A/003C, requesting a Final Plat for thirty-one (31) residential lots, zoned RVS (Recreational Vehicle Subdivision) on 4.66 acres located in Township 5N, Range 13W, Section 21 of the Gila and Salt River Meridian, in Salome.

He described the project, noting that there will be three phases totaling approximately 300 lots when it is finished; with the northern portion of the project adjacent to the runway for Indian Hills Airpark. He added that the applicant will provide the 400-foot minimum distance plus the 65-foot height distance.

Chief Building Inspector Baker stated that notification was sent to the adjoining property owners and no comments had been received. He added that one stipulation is requested; to sign an A.R.S. §1134 (207) Waiver.

Chairman Irwin opened the public hearing and asked if anyone wished to comment on the request for a Final Plat.

Hugo Acua, representing Sunland & Associates land surveyors, noted that the first phase is 8.81 acres, not 4.66 acres.

Brief comments were made regarding the required bonding, and speculation was made on when development would start, in which Chief Building Inspector Baker stated that he would be consulting others in order to get a bond in place before moving forward with any development.

CHAIRMAN IRWIN MOVED to approve Docket No. FP2011-004, Sunset Indian Hills, APN: 304-70-003A/003C, for a Final Plat for thirty-one (31) residential lots, zoned RVS (Recreational Vehicle Subdivision) on 8.81 acres with the stipulation that an A.R.S. §12-1134 (207) Waiver be signed; property located in Township 5N, Range 13W, Section 21 of the Gila and Salt River Meridian, in Salome. Motion seconded by Supervisor Pierce, passed unanimously.

Ordinance No. 2011-05, repealing Ordinance No. 96-01 (1996 Zoning Regulations) and all associated ordinances and revisions and adopting the La Paz County Zoning Regulations, including paper zoning maps based on digital data stored in the County geographic information system, providing for map updates as zoning of property becomes effective; and fixing the effective date thereof

Chief Building Inspector Baker presented Ordinance No. 2011-05, repealing Ordinance No. 96-01 (1996 Zoning Regulations) and all associated ordinances and revisions and adopting the La Paz County Zoning Regulations, including paper zoning maps based on digital data stored in the County geographic information system, providing for map updates as zoning of property becomes effective; and fixing the effective date thereof.

He noted this will be La Paz County's new zoning ordinance/regulations which will be in 3-ring binder format.

He stated that his department will be creating an email list in which those who wish to be notified of the changes to the ordinances when they take place will have the ability to print them out for their own records.

He described some of the formatting changes, noting that an R4 (Heavy Use/Heavy Density) Zoning District for hotels/motels and associated businesses; a section for site built residences on five acres for those who wish to split into halves instead of three acres and two acres, which was previously required. He further noted that a Public Utility District has been added, eliminating the need for a Special Use Permit, such as for photovoltaic or wind farms with the exception of bio-gas or bio-fuel production; looking towards possible future needs. He stated that the Public Utility District would allow for L-1 (Light Industrial) use, which could be used by those who were unable to get a grant or other funding required and not significantly impact an area.

He further stated that Special Use Permits will essentially be done away with, having added as many uses as possible to the new regulations; adding Conditional Use Permits that could be attached to the property so that it extends in a transfer of ownership, and provide for situations that are more accurately “special” or “conditional” uses.

Chief Building Inspector Baker stated that the map section in the Department’s GIS system will be retained and offered on the County website.

Chairman Irwin opened the public hearing and asked if anyone wished to comment on the proposed ordinance.

Pat Jones, member of the Planning and Zoning Commission, stated that their Board unanimously approved the new regulations, commending the work done on it.

Scott Higginson, representing Vidler Water, expressed appreciation for the new regulations, and the new Public Utility Zoning; expressing his hopes to be the first applicant in the County for this new District and for the ability to market the property, not only for electrical power, but for light industry.

There being no further comments, Chairman Irwin closed the public hearing.

Supervisor Drum stated that he wished to commend Chief Building Inspector Baker on the achievement of this final draft.

SUPERVISOR DRUM MOVED to adopt Ordinance No. 2011-05, repealing Ordinance No. 96-01 (1996 Zoning Regulations) and all associated ordinances and revisions and adopting the La Paz County Zoning Regulations, including paper zoning maps based on digital data stored in the County geographic information system, providing for map updates as zoning of property becomes effective; and fixing the effective date thereof. Motion seconded by Supervisor Pierce, passed unanimously.

SUPERVISOR DRUM MOVED to approve nineteen (19) tax roll corrections with the net result being +\$11,497.03 as presented by Assessor Nault. Motion seconded by Supervisor Pierce, passed unanimously.

Approve purchase of two replacement computers, an unbudgeted item, from Fill the Gap Funds – Public Defender

Acting Public Defender Sorrell requested approval to purchase two replacement computers to replace outdated computers in which replacement parts have been scavenged from other units for some time to keep running. She noted that an opportunity has arisen to purchase replacements from Fill the Gap Funds.

SUPERVISOR DRUM MOVED to approve the purchase of two replacement computers, an unbudgeted item, from Fill the Gap Funds for the Public Defender’s office. Motion seconded by Supervisor Pierce, passed unanimously.

Ratify approval for emergency repair of two (2) pumps at Emerald Canyon Golf Course, an unbudgeted item – Golf Course

County Administrator Field, on behalf of Golf Professional Benton, requested approval to ratify costs for the emergency repair of two pumps at the Emerald Canyon Golf Course, an unbudgeted item, in the amount of \$30,305.68.

He stated that future bonding will look at changing out these types of pumps for “variable speed” types needed during over-seeding, because of the difficulties encountered with pipes when new pumps are added.

County Administrator Field also noted that Buckskin Sanitary District is also requesting the change take place.

SUPERVISOR PIERCE MOVED to ratify approval for emergency repair of two pumps at Emerald Canyon Golf Course, and authorize payment to Gilbert Pump & Equipment in the amount of \$30,305.68, an unbudgeted item. Motion seconded by Supervisor Drum, passed unanimously.

Accept the Colorado River Indian Tribes and State of Arizona Gaming Compact contribution on behalf of the La Paz County Cooperative Extension – Finance

County Administrator Field requested acceptance of the Colorado River Indian Tribes and State of Arizona Gaming Compact contribution on behalf of the La Paz County Cooperative Extension. He stated the tribal contribution amounts to \$17,260.32, which will help fund the University of Arizona Cooperative Extension.

SUPERVISOR PIERCE MOVED to accept the Colorado River Indian Tribes and State of Arizona Gaming Compact contribution (in the amount of \$17,260.32) on behalf of the University of Arizona La Paz County Cooperative Extension. Motion seconded by Supervisor Drum, passed unanimously.

Approve waiver of La Paz County Park vehicle fees for non-profit organizations – Board of Supervisors

County Administrator Field stated this request was for the waiving of fees at County Parks for non-profit organization vehicles, such as for car shows. He stated that this was brought about when a car show was held to benefit a non-profit organization's scholarship program and was charged a fee. He clarified that a \$2 car fee waived would be for cars actually in the show, not other vehicles. He stated that this approval would allow for an administrative decision on such occurrences.

Discussion ensued regarding the issue, noting that this provision would be exclusively for vehicles used in raising charitable funds, and proof of this would be required. It was also noted that consideration should be considered given to other charitable projects.

County Administrator Field volunteered to develop a policy that would allow these type decisions to be made administratively and perhaps have a worksession to discuss the proposed policy.

SUPERVISOR DRUM MOVED to approve waiver of La Paz County Park vehicle fees for non-profit organizations to George Nault in the amount of \$68. Motion seconded by Chairman Irwin, passed unanimously.

Approve to publish notice of a Public Hearing for the partial abandonment of a portion of the Sunset Drive cul-de-sac in the Moovalya Estates Subdivision located in Section 22, Township 10 North, Range 19 West, of the Gila and Salt River Meridian – Public Works

Right-of-Way Agent Bennett requested approval to publish notice of a Public Hearing for the partial abandonment of a portion of the Sunset Drive cul-de-sac in the Moovalya Estates Subdivision located in Section 22, Township 10 North, Range 19 West, of the Gila and Salt River Meridian.

She stated that a petition was received requesting abandonment of the northerly most half of this cul-de-sac. She noted that the surrounding property owners were notified along with any utility services. She stated that the next step would be to publish a date for a public hearing.

Supervisor Pierce noted that there were quite a few people that sent emails objecting to this abandonment, saying that it would take away their ability to turn around.

Right-of-Way Agent Bennett stated that there is some amount of encroachment; however, it does not take up the whole cul-de-sac. She added that, because of the commercial aspects of that road, it is also necessary for a turn around area.

Supervisor Drum stated that the area is all commercial, and this space is needed for a turn around. He stated that just one person would be benefiting from this change, and he felt that all parties should benefit from this decision.

SUPERVISOR DRUM MOVED to deny publication of a notice of a Public Hearing for the partial abandonment of a portion of the Sunset Drive cul-de-sac in the Moovalya Estates Subdivision located in Section 22, Township 10 North, Range 19 West, of the Gila and Salt River Meridian. Motion seconded by Supervisor Pierce, passed unanimously.

Approve Data Access/Exchange Intergovernmental Agreement #IGA/JPA 11-177 AG Contract No. P001-2011-003545 with the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) – Public Works

Interim Public Works Director Simmons requested approval of a Data Access/Exchange Intergovernmental Agreement #IGA/JPA 11-177 AG Contract No. P001-2011-003545 with the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT). He stated that ADOT has information that is valuable to the department for their use, and this agreement would formally allow access to that information.

Supervisor Pierce stated that the information obtained assists the County to obtain Federal and State funds.

SUPERVISOR PIERCE MOVED to approve Data Access/Exchange Intergovernmental Agreement #IGA/JPA 11-177 AG Contract No. P001-2011-003545 with the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT). Motion seconded by Supervisor Drum, passed unanimously.

Ratify advertisement to hire four temporary employees for the “crack sealing season”, a four month time period - Public Works

Interim Public Works Director Simmons requested ratification of an approval to advertise to hire four temporary employees for the “crack sealing season”, a four month time period. He stated that the “season is up on us”, and will be no longer than four months.

County Administrator Field stated that this action is being ratified because the department is already advertising to save time on the short season.

SUPERVISOR DRUM MOVED to approve advertisement to hire four temporary employees for the “crack sealing season”, a four month period. Motion seconded by Chairman Irwin, passed unanimously.

Approve promotion of Maintenance Worker II to Maintenance Worker III – Public Works (Replacement/Promotion)

Interim Public Works Director Simmons requested the promotion of Michael Schwaner from Maintenance Worker II to Maintenance Worker III after another employee was promoted to a vacant position, leaving this position also vacant. He stated that starting salary would be \$27,902, for an effective date of December 5, 2011.

SUPERVISOR DRUM MOVED to approve the promotion of Michael Schwaner from Maintenance Worker II to Maintenance Worker III, effective date of December 5, 2011, at a salary of \$27,902 (NE047, Step 1). Motion seconded by Supervisor Pierce, passed unanimously.

Appoint temporary Court Clerk – Quartzsite Justice Court (Replacement)

County Administrator Field requested approval to appoint Amanda Rae Lilly as a temporary Court Clerk, retroactive to November 28, 2011, to fill a vacated position, at the rate of \$8 per hour.

County Administrator Field stated that this temporary position is replacing another temporary position.

SUPERVISOR PIERCE MOVED to appoint Amanda Rae Lilly as a temporary Court Clerk, a vacant position, retroactive to November 28, 2011, at the rate of \$8 per hour. Motion seconded by Supervisor Drum, passed unanimously.

Call to the Public

Assessor Nault announced his retirement effective January 1, 2012. He thank his staff and the Board of Supervisors, saying that it was an honor to have worked with them; adding that he felt the one person that could run his office would be Chief Deputy Schuler.

“Squeak” Kosner noted that the desert backroads had all been re-graded, and considering the tight budgets, questioned the expense of gas for that purpose.

Supervisor Drum stated that those roads were primitive roads and the County has a responsibility to maintain them to a minimum for the safety of the many people that use them. He noted that it was a budgeted item.

Supervisor Pierce added that the Colorado River Indian Tribes (CRIT) asked for some of that re-grading to be done and paid for it.
